Aborigines Out on Strike Again

DARWIN, Monday.—With their rations assured, the majority of Darwin aborigines went on strike again this morning for the third time in eight weeks. They are still demanding £7 a week wages and full civil rights.

All aborigines at Berlinah aboriginal reserve refused to go to work this morning. However, a number of aborigines living on private premises in the town are still working.

The acting secretary of the North Australian Workers Union (Mr. 7 Geel) said today the aborigine rations are assured even the Native Affairs (Mr. F. H. Moy) confirmed this afternoon that a number of aborigines from Berrimah reserve had gone been promised by several large trade union organisations in cause of the strikes. the south.

Militant officials of the N.A.W.U. are taking an increasing part in the direction of the strike. A N.A.W.U. or-ganiser said today the aborigines would not go back to work unless they were granted "decent wages and conditions and civil rights."
