

Darwin natives strike again: union help

DARWIN, Monday.—Most of the aborigines in Darwin went on strike again today for the third time in eight weeks. Their demands are the same as before—£7 a week wages and full civil rights.

All of the natives in the conditions as white station Berrimah aboriginal reserve hands. refused to go to work. The N.A.W.U. organiser (Mr. number have gone "work about" in the bush. One today bailed out aborigine Billy Palata pending his appeal to the Supreme Court against one month's gaol on a charge of having hindered a constable in the execution of his duty in the last natives strike.

The acting secretary of the North Australian Workers' Union (Mr. T. Peel) said today that if the Native Affairs Branch cut the strikers' rations, several large trade unions in the south would provide money for the natives' food.

Militant N.A.W.U. officials are helping to direct the strike.

The union intends to press for a new pastoral award which would give natives the same
