Conditions The students are members of the Student Action for Aborigines Council and are making a survey of conditions affecting aborigines in north-western and northern towns of the State.

On Monday they demonstrated before the R.S.L. and a frock shop in Walgett and became involved in a num-

ber of angry scenes. At 9 p.m. the local Church of England Council gave them one hour to leave a church hall where they

had stayed on Sunday night. A "Herald" reporter who is travelling with the students said the students left Walgett in their bus after being asked to vacate the hall.

The truck had appeared about three miles out of town, overtaken the bus, allowed it to pass and then overtaken the bus again.

The bus ran off the road. The Rev. T. D. Noffs, pastor of the Methodist Church Wayside Chapel at King's Cross, said yesterday he had talked with the student leader, Mr Charles Perkins, a 29-year-old part-aboriginal, about the incident.

Mr Noffs said he had given the students advice before they left, at their request, about how to conduct a social survey on their tour.

Mr Noffs said that apart from the bus incident, "the trip has otherwise been quite successful."
