STRUGGLE FOR 'EMBASSY'

CANBERRA, Sun. — More than 250 police today foiled a bid to restore the Aboriginal 'embassy' to the lawns outside Parliament House.

Police and demonstrators, some Abariginal and some white, clashed in a ten minute struggle before the tent "embassy" was taken away.

Aboriginal leaders afterwards predicted more violent confronta-

tions.
"We will not let it rest here," Miss Bobbi Sykes, one of their leaders, said.

Demonstrators said they were unlikely to take any further action until after Tuesday. when they will apply for a court injunction preventing police acting on an ordinance which forbids trespassing on Commonwealth land.

Storm

Gazetial of the ordinance last Thursday allowed police to atorin the "embassy" and remove it.

zens of Aborigines and their supporters have flocked to Canberra from NSW, Queensland and Victoria.

Today shout 100

Five white youths carrying a tent, poles and pegs later joined the crowd.

Crowd

As two police moved to the back of the crowd, the demonstrators awarmed on to the lawns, and within acconds had restored the "embassy" to its former place.

Demonstrators, including several pregnant women, linked arms in a tight circle around the tent while some of their leaders shouled abuse at the police.

Others urged moderation.

After a 10-minute brawl the "embassy" disappeared and about a dozen demonstrators were arrested.
