## Aborigines plan new 'embassy'

About 2,500 Aborigines will firmly entrench themselves on the lawns outside Parliament House in Canberra from November 9 to 11.

Announcing this in Adelaide yesterday the national co-ordinator of the Canberra Aboriginal Embassy (Mr. G. Foley) said they would protest against lack of land rights and the removal of Mr. Bryant, now Minister for the ACT, as Minister for Aboriginal Affairs.

Mr. Foley, 23, is in Adelaide to raise money so SA Aborigines can join the embassy.

A great number of Aborigines in SA wanted to go to Canberra.

"Last year they were there in great numbers," Mr. Foley said.

The embassy would be set up permanently and would be expanded.

He did not expect the embassy to be removed by the police.

"Unlike the previous administration I don't think Mr. Whitlam is politically naive." he said.

He respected Mr. Whitlam as a leader even though he was arrogant and conceited.

Aborigines wanted the terms of reference of the Woodward Commission to be widened to include compensation for land alienation, minerals and water rights.

"At present the terms cover only the Northern Territory and certain other tribal areas," Mr. Foley said.
