"It's the bit about breathing in through your nose and blowing out your mouth at the same time that gets me," Mancini said.

Sir Douglas said the American composer's first attempt at playing the instrument was good. Mancini gave a concert in Melbourne last night and will appear at Festival Hall again tenight
