Aborigines go 'bush' in China

PEKING, Feb. 11 .- An Australian Aboriginal delegalon is now visiting the communes of minority groups in a remote southern province of China.

The 11-man delegation, led by Aboriginal leader Garry Foley, has gone to he Kwangsi Chuang autonomous region on the border with North Vietnam.

The Chinese Foreign Minstry said the trip was the ast stage of the delegation's visit to China before leaves for home by way of Canton and Hong Kong in February 17.

The delegation was exected to tour the autonomous region by truck to visit the minority peoples cattered through the mounainous country of (wangsi.

The area is inhabited nainly by Chunag people but inocludes other minority roups such as Yao and

liao peoples.

The Chinese claim that he minority peoples, while lving commune-style under he control of the central Government, have been able

to preserve their distinctive identities and cultures.

Before leaving Peking, Mr. Foley said the delega-tion was keen to see whether the experiences of the minority peoples was relevant to the situation of Aborigines in Australia.

The delegation visited Hunan Province on its way to Kwangsi and went to Shao Shan, birthplace of Chairman Mao Tse-tung.
