Long wait on police claims

Policemen who lodged claims for compensation for loss or injury incurred during the Aboriginal "embassy" demonstrations 21 years ago have received nothing yet.

Individual policemen who suffered injury or loss in the demonstrations, in July, 1972, were told that the At-1972, were told that the At-torney-General's Depart-ment would pay their claims after the legislation under which police had acted was declared invalid in the ACT Supreme Court, and charges against those arrested were dismissed. dismissed.

dismissed.

Normally, compensation would be paid in addition to fines by those convicted.

A spokesman for the department said yesterday that officers were still examining the claims, which had been submitted by solicitors acting for the police, but that a decision might be expected soon. pected soon.

Some of the hold-up was caused by attempts to esti-mate the amount of com-pensation to be paid for in-juries, he said. While it was comparatively easy to fix a value on a broken watch, or lost police cap, it was more difficult to assess the value of a black eye, or scratched

face. Mr John Oldroyd, from the ACT Police Association, said yesterday that people actually arrested in the demonstrations had been compensation long

ago.

He had been informed I at e yesterday, after questions had been submitted by The Canberra Times to the department, that the matter had now been sent to the Treasury. he said.
