None of the other shareholders moving up the stairs were being questioned. Mr. Foley said.

"I showed him my proxy form and he still refused to allow me by."

Mr. Foley and a member of the Campaign Against Racial Exploitation ran up the stairs, chased by the questioner, and presented their proxies, watched by their pursuer. The proxies were declared valid.
